What Do Voters Need on Election Day?

Voter Name, Address, and form(s) of Identification

- Identification can be a combination of all sorts of things, visit recorder.maricopa.gov/voteridcard to see which IDs are valid forms of identification and how you can mix & match

Voter Care Duties

- Promote social distancing
- Distribute PPE/hand sanitizer/water
- Act as a source of information (ie: location of restrooms, open voting hours, and general voting info at your polling location)
- Encourage voters to hydrate, sanitize, and stay in line!

Fact Sheet on the 2nd Amendment & Private Militias

In 1866, and again in 2008, the Supreme Court ruled that the second amendment "does not prevent the prohibition of private military organizations."

The Arizona Constitution forbids private military units from operating outside state authority providing that "[t]he military shall be in strict subordination to the civil power." Ariz. Const. art. II, § 20.

Arizona Statutes:

Prohibition on private military units: Arizona law makes it illegal for groups of people to organize as private militias. It is a felony for any “person, partnership or corporation,” other than state and local law enforcement, “sheriff’s posses,” and armed security guards protecting businesses, to “maintain troops under arms.” Ariz. Rev. Stat. Ann. § 26-123.

Prohibition on unauthorized wearing of uniform: In Arizona, it is a misdemeanor for any person “to wear any part of the uniform of the national guard” or the U.S. armed forces, “or a uniform so similar as to be easily mistaken therefor, unless the person is a member of the service whose uniform he wears” or a veterans association. Ariz. Rev. Stat. Ann. § 26-170.
